

Over the last five years, our organization has had to think on its feet and adapt to the rollercoaster of the health crisis. 

3. FUNDING FOR ENTREPRENEURS

Injecting funds into the local economy, the next generation of entrepreneurs and future-forward initiatives is at the core of the mission of SADCs and CAEs.

The RRRF, the Regular Investment and Youth Strategy funds, CDAP and the Tourism Small Business Assistance Projects have facilitated thousands of loans to support local entrepreneurs.

1. SUPPORT FOR LOCAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

SADCs and CAEs supported local economic development projects through funds and programs such as the LIM, Virage Vert (local economic development component) and RRRF.

4,241 joint projects **\$29 MILLION** in investments

2. TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE SERVICES

These local services help entrepreneurs with their business projects by giving them access to expertise and coaching from SADC and CAE professionals. Available as a standalone service, this technical assistance is offered with or without financing. Several thousand entrepreneurs have been able to take advantage of this key technical assistance under the LIM and Sustainable Development programs' technical assistance components and under the RRRF.



A NEARLY HALF A BILLION DOLLAR IMPACT ON QUEBEC'S ECONOMY

A new study by Aviseo showed the significant impact that SADCs and CAEs had on Quebec's economic vitality over the 2019 to 2023 fiscal years.*

Impact on the increased GDP

SADC and CAE investments increased Quebec's realGDP by \$458 million:

- → \$185 million from our loan investments.
- ightarrow \$273 million generated by increased business survival rates

A \$217 million increase in government revenue

The work of SADCs and CAEs yields economic and fiscal impacts that benefit everyone in Quebec, including households, businesses and the Government. It generated \$104 million in revenue for businesses and \$296 million for households.

- → \$92 million generated in government tax revenue through investments from loans granted by SADCs and CAEs
- → \$120 million in government revenue generated through the impact of SADCs and CAEs on increased business survival rates

Recall that a Statistics Canada study found that businesses that receive support from an SADC or CAE in their first four years of operations are, on average, more than twice as likely to survive past their fifth year compared to businesses that do not have this support.

Three complementary business lines and areas of expertise aligned with Quebec's goals

SADCs and CAEs deliver three business lines: local economic development, specialized support and business financing. SADCs and CAEs have also cultivated various areas of expertise to better address the specific issues affecting their local communities. SADCs' and CAEs' local development efforts help to increase business stability, improve business competitiveness, promote job creation and improve population retention in Quebec's regions. We take an active role in:

- → Promoting an ecological transition toward a more sustainable economy – SADCs and CAEs are highly active in sustainable development, having invested more than \$10 million in the last year to help small businesses go greener, faster.
- → Ensuring that the next generation of entrepreneurs can take the reins, specifically via the Youth Strategy program, which has invested \$165 million into 14,000 young people over the past 26 years.
- Address the new trend of women entrepreneurs and flexipreneurship. SADCs and CAEs are currently working on a support program specifically designed for part-time entrepreneurs, a growing client base that few organizations serve.

2023-2024 in a nutshell

If we had to name a theme for last year, it would be **Count On Us. Count On Us** to promote our land, our heritage and our innovations. **Count On Us** to develop the world of tomorrow here and now, with green initiatives, young entrepreneurs, and municipalities and businesses that embrace new technologies. Local entrepreneurs can and do **count on us**—the Réseau and their local SADCs and CAEs.

→ Spotlight on ASM Consultants and La Fabrique Nordique, who shared their stories about the Canada Digital Adoption Program (CDAP) in Le Soleil.



- → We attended the Rendez-vous national du développement local, organized by the Fédération québécoise des municipalités (FQM) at the Lévis Centre des congrès.
- Our annual general meetings were held virtually due to fires that forced the Val-d'Or conference to be cancelled.
- → A job well done deserves recognition! The Réseau announced the results of the Projet d'aide aux petites entreprises touristiques alongside its implementation partners the Fédération des chambres de commerce du Quebec (FCCQ), the Canada Economic Development for Quebec Regions and Minister Pascale St-Onge—who all helped to quickly and effectively deliver the project. A total of \$40 million was invested in 1,040 businesses, \$20 million of which was granted to 665 Quebec businesses by local SADCs and CAEs.



→ The Réseau participated as a partner and jury member in the 24th edition of the OSEntreprendre Challenge's national gala. Plus, we unveiled the 14 regional winners of the flexipreneur regional favourite prize from the Réseau des SADC et CAE in June.

At the 81st annual conference of the Fédération québécoise des municipalités (FQM), the Réseau gave a presentation about exciting new initiatives, like the development of Kamouraska's mushroom industry, which encourages entrepreneurs to harness the potential of edible mushrooms.



→ We offered SADC and CAE clients throughout Quebec entrepreneurship training in partnership with the École d'Entrepreneurship de Beauce (EEB). Thanks to support from the Lemaire Family Foundation and the Ministère de l'Économie, de l'Innovation et de l'Énergie, clients were able to access the decision-making bootcamp Séjour intensif – Décider, normally \$2,200, for just \$500. A few dozen entrepreneurs were selected to attend the September 25 and 26, 2023, bootcamp held at EEB, in Saint-Georges in the Beauce region of Chaudière-Appalaches.



- → The Réseau held its strategic retreat, with representatives from all of Quebec's regions in attendance.
- → The Réseau mounted a new ad campaign, featuring Indira Moudi from Viandes Lafrance and Olivier Marcoux from Bromont Campervan. The six-week-long "SADC + CAE: Stories that count" major campaign aimed to raise awareness about our organization and how it has made a difference. Ads were designed to reach our primary target audience of businesspeople and investors in Quebec through their preferred media channels.

2023-2024 in a nutshell

→ CAE Haute-Yasmaska et région met for the first time with the honourable Soraya Martinez Ferrada, to discuss local economic development issues and opportunities for entrepreneurs in the region.

The Lévis Centre des congrès played host to the Réseau des SADC et CAE's annual mid-year meeting, which brought together the Réseau's driving force over 140 SADC and CAE professionals from across Quebec—to share their expertise, attend talks and take trainings.



→ Spotlight on regional businesses and their products! Quebec SADCs and CAEs promoted unique local products in a new Réseau campaign all December long.



→ The Flexi-Loan for Women project launched on January 8 to support and fund Quebec's part-time women entrepreneurs. Over \$1.5 million will be invested as loans by the 11 participating SADCs and CAEs to support flexipreneurs, a growing niche in Quebec's entrepreneurial landscape.

- → The Tournée nationale sur le repreneuriat is off to a strong start! The business succession tour, organized by the FCCQ and the CTEQ, brought together experts for a breakfast talk to help entrepreneurs better understand the transfer process, share their best practices and give advice on real-life scenarios. The Réseau sat on the panel in 10 administrative regions and the tour continues through September 2024 in other regions.
- → SADCs and CAEs have a major impact on Quebec's economic vitality! The results of a new economic study were released and show that we've generated nearly half a billion dollars in economic returns since 2019.
- → We streamed a flexipreneur time management webinar to help part-time entrepreneurs deal with cognitive overload, get a handle on time management best practices and better manage a variety of tasks.





- → The presidents met with representatives of Canada Economic Development for Quebec Regions at Entourage-Sur-le-Lac to present an agreement in principle for the upcoming renewal of our five-year agreements.
- → The Réseau strengthened its partnership with Community Futures Network of Canada (CFNC). In November, Pascal Harvey, presidentgeneral director of the Réseau des SADC et CAE was appointed secretary of the CFNC, which is made up of 267 CFDCs, CBDCs, SADCs and CAEs across Canada that are, more than ever before, working in unison to help spur economic development in local communities around Canada. We also attended quarterly meetings with our colleagues from other provinces.

Exciting news! At the start of the 2024-2025 year, the Réseau's board of administrators announced the appointment of Pascal Harvey as president-general director and Pierre-Olivier Colas as assistant general director. This changing of the guard is sure to reinvigorate Quebec's economic development network.



For over 40 years, the Réseau has brought together 57 SADCs and 10 CAEs, which strive to support economic development in Quebec's regions. We have 400 professionals and over 600 volunteers implementing the Community Futures Program (CFP) in Quebec's regions, supporting and financing more than 10,000 entrepreneurs and 1,500 local economic development projects annually. The CFP is a federal program that recognizes the expertise of local decision makers and decision-making autonomy, in order to encourage communities to take charge of their futures. There are also 269 funded CFDCs and CBDCs implementing the CFP across the rest of the country.




IMPACT OF THE LOCAL INTERVENTION MEASURE (LIM)

SADCs and CAEs implement and support joint projects to drive local economic vitality. This year, a total of \$7.4 million went to support 947 projects.

Impact of the Local Intervention Measure (LIM)

On top of their regular budget, SADCs and CAEs have a program dedicated to local economic development projects called the Local Intervention Measure (LIM). This year, \$2.5 million was invested in 379 joint projects. These projects were chosen to benefit local communities and entrepreneurs, especially women and young people, by fostering business development, primarily through skills enhancement. Many of the projects tackled issues related to the workforce and how to ensure rural areas remain attractive places to live.

More specifically, the LIM has helped to cover professional fees to complete projects, nearly half of which were led by SADC and CAE development officers. The LIM has a multiplier effect as it allows other investors, key local actors and complementary resources to get involved in entrepreneurs' projects. When stakeholders join forces, it creates incredible value—namely, an estimated \$15.4 million in total investments across all projects.





INSPIRING JOINT PROJECTS

Business transfer club

The SADC de Lotbinière and the SADC de l'Amiante join forces for business succession

The SADC de Lotbinière and the SADC de l'Amiante banded together to set up a business transfer club that serves as a confidential space for entrepreneurs to meet and learn more about what to expect when selling their business. Members attended five half-day workshops held between October 2023 and March 2024, where they explored topics such as deciding to sell your business, starting the sale process, valuating your business and other legal issues, and handling family business successions. At the final workshop, a psychologist specialized in supporting entrepreneurs came in to discuss how to prepare for starting a new life after the transfer.



GOING HAZELNUTS

SADCs in Bas-Saint-Laurent

On a mission to develop the hazelnut industry: A foray into Ontario and the American Midwest

In fall 2023, Biopterre (specialist in applied research and technology transfers), the Bioproducts Development Centre and Filières PFNL et Cultures innovantes du Bas-Saint-Laurent set up a project to explore the economics of hazelnut farming. The team, which includes several producers and actors in the hazelnut industry, visited Ontario and the American Midwest to learn and draw inspiration from these two regions, some of the biggest hazelnut producers in North America..

Over the course of seven days, the group visited new and old hazelnut farms alike (one dates back 45 years!) and nurseries and researchers developing hybrid hazelnut cultivars with higher yields and better disease resistance. This visit was part of a longer term technical and financial collaboration of eight SADCs in Bas-Saint-Laurent to develop the hazelnut industry. There are currently 15 hazelnut producers in Bas Saint Laurent who are members of the experimental hazelnut network, under the supervision of the Biopterre product development centre in La Pocatière. The Bas Saint Laurent SADCs helped identify where to conduct the research, which producers to recruit and train and how to promote Quebec's burgeoning hazelnut industry.




The SADC Témiscouata's Grand Tour

The Bas-Saint-Laurent is the only region in Quebec that boasts three tourist routes, each of which is managed by a different group: the Route des Navigateurs (the 132) along the St. Lawrence River, the Route des Frontières (the 289) tracing the borders of the Bas-St-Laurent, New Brunswick and Maine, and the Route des Monts Notre-Dame, which follows the Appalachian Mountains through the area's rural countryside.

In 2023, the Association touristique du Bas-St-Laurent began brainstorming how to consolidate the management of these three routes, which had been less actively managed in recent years, to better structure the tourism offering and increase traffic, by advertising a loop of tourist attractions à la route 66, a legendary road trip route in the United States

To this end, a committee of regional partners was established, including the SADC de Témiscouata, the SADC de la Neigette, the SADC de La Mitis, three RCMs in the Bas Saint Laurent region, the Association touristique du Bas-St-Laurent, the Collectif régional de développement du Bas-St-Laurent, the Corporation des Monts Notre-Dame and the Corporation de développement économique du Transcontinental. SADC de Témiscouata's leadership team played a major role in mobilizing partners, identifying potential management models and developing tools to successfully restructure tourism in the region.

These partners now have a shared vision of tourism development and are taking concrete action to build up and promote this one-of-a-kind tourism loop in Quebec.


The sustainable development group also drew inspiration from best practices across Quebec, sending 37 members to visit businesses working with SADC Haute-Côte-Nord in Tadoussac last September. One of the businesses visited was Groupe Boisaco, a local cooperative specialized in wood processing and recovery.



Virage Vert program

March 31, 2024, marked the end of the Virage Vert program, a program designed to accelerate sustainable development in Quebec. The results have been incredible—more and more businesses are making major eco-friendly strides with support from their SADCs and CAEs.

MULTI PROJECTS: Stronger together

THE RÉSEAU RALLIES **ITS MEMBERS**

The Réseau used a special budget set aside under the Virage Vert program to organize various projects in conjunction with a steering committee made up of SADC and CAE representatives.

Thanks to this special budget, all interested SADCs and CAEs were able to take part in a training path on sustainable development coaching and responsible financing. In total, 120 Réseau professionals took six refresher trainings with experts from the consulting firm Millani and the Centre de transfert technologique en écologie industrielle (CTTEI).

Millani's four responsible financing workshops aimed to:

- → Train SADCs and CAEs on the ecosystem, trends and opportunities surrounding responsible investment in order to promote it as an approach to consider in their financing processes and policies
- → Demystify responsible investment by developing tools (an analytical grid template featuring nine issues as well as three policy templates) to help SADCs and CAEs adopt new criteria for their funds and practices.

Preliminary post-workshop outcomes: 80.5% of respondents said they would include four to eight ESG criteria in their application assessment process.

The two workshops in the CTTEI's training path focused on exploring the circular economy and aimed to:

- → Develop shared tools to make it easier for business advisors to pinpoint businesses' sustainable development needs
- → Provide an overview of the industrial symbiosis in each area and how SADCs and CAEs can contribute

The Réseau also launched studies to review sustainable development certification and to get a better picture of sustainable financing in Quebec so that we can improve the strategic position of our coaching.

CALL FOR LOCAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS FOR SADCS AND CAES

The Virage Vert program issued a call for proposals from SADCs and CAEs with multi-stakeholder sustainable initiatives; six projects received a total of \$322,789 in funding.

A total of six multi-stakeholder projects were conducted with support from multiple SADCs and CAEs in the same area and from other economic development stakeholders. Here is a list of these projects, each more inspiring than the other!

SADCS HELP ESTRIE ADVANCE SUSTAINABLE TOURISM

Estrie's seven SADCs and CAEs, joined by Tourism Eastern Townships and Destination Sherbrooke, hired a shared resource for a one-year contract to carry out sustainable tourism initiatives. This shared resource will implement a regional action plan for responsible, sustainable tourism to support local tourism businesses in embracing sustainable development practices. Outreach and expertise-sharing activities, discussion workshops and themed speaking events will be conducted to help these businesses make the Eastern Townships into a responsible, sustainable tourist destination. Two committees were established to assist the resource's work: a steering committee and a management committee.

Impact in numbers:

- → Around 20 businesses took steps to become sustainable tourism certified after conducting various assessments of their practices. Five different businesses developed a structured action plan with actionable benchmarks.
- → A total of 20 businesses moved beyond the awareness stage and were trained to use various structuring tools.
- → A total of 50 businesses received work tools to help them develop a self assessment too, an action plan with monitoring indicators, giving them a better chance of long-term success as several of these initiatives will reduce their waste management and energy costs.

- → Le Marais de la Rivière-aux-Cerises conducted several environmental impact reports that highlight the outcomes of its scientific research project on climate change.
- → Le Parc de la Gorge de Coaticook performed a carbon footprint assessment of its activities.

NEXT PHASE

A follow-up to the project is underway. The steering committee for the sustainable tourism project held a meeting in April to determine various options to make available to tourism businesses in the 2.0 phase, including possible access to technical assistance.

A \$145,000 budget has been allocated for efforts such as:

- → Developing different forms of training
- → Creating six new fact sheets on best practices for sustainable development.
- → Developing a free toolbox including a GHG emission assessment in partnership with Tourisme durable Québec.
- → Conducting a tour of speaking events and success stories.

STUDY ON THE RECYCLING POTENTIAL OF ASHES GENERATED IN NORD-DU-QUÉBEC

Wood ash is a by-product generated by several manufacturing plants in Nord du Québec. Unlike other parts of the province, Nord du Québec currently disposed of its ashes in landfills since the region has too few crop fields to recycle all the ashes produced in the area. Local businesses may be keen to find more sustainable ways to manage their production waste, but lack of knowledge, dedicated funds, time or examples to follow make implementation difficult.

The resulting literature review and map of ash generation in Nord-du-Québec will eventually be used to develop a turnkey reference document that will help local ash producers navigate various aspects of ash recycling, such as choosing the best recycling method for their business and figuring out how to use that method, the permits/authorizations required to do so, the environmental standards to follow, and any other relevant information. This project aims to bring new circular economy solutions to the region by making it easier for ash producers to recycle by-product ashes. The study has brought to light potential recycling strategies applicable to Nord-du-Québec's agricultural, and possibly silvicultural, operations.


FIXING TO GO THE DISTANCE

Lanaudière's LanOTR, a business specializing in retreading and repairing tires, was hoping to boost the number of tires restored through his services. With the help of SADC d'Autray Joliette and the Virage vert program, LanOTR was able to perform the life-cycle assessment he wanted and now repairs and retreads 1,711 and 2,093 tires respectively, equating to 141,000 trees saved.



GIVING CONSTRUCTION WASTE A SECOND LIFE

After receiving funds from SADC Côte-Nord under the Virage Vert program and Mitacs, Pavage Béton TC Inc. in Sept-Îles partnered with École de technologie supérieure (ÉTS) to turn construction waste into a circular, sustainable resource for a better future.





Both our members and the Réseau have ramped up their efforts to encourage business succession, including by raising awareness about its importance among entrepreneurs and decision makers and by using training activities to guide entrepreneurs through the business transfer process. We also played an active role in supporting business succession by focusing our efforts on young people and flexipreneurs.

TRAINING AND AWARENESS ACTIVITIES

- → The Réseau attended the business succession tour organized by the FCCQ, the Centre de transfert d'entreprise du Québec (CTEQ) and other partners, such as the Morency law firm and Raymond Chabot Grant Thornton. The tour made its way to around ten regions during the year, providing up-and-coming entrepreneurs with tangible strategies from business succession experts. The tour is set to reach a total of 17 regions by September
- → The President-General Director of the Réseau des SADC et CAE attended the Semaine du repreneuriat [Business succession week] and the Sommet du repreneuriat [Business succession summit].

THE YOUTH STRATEGY: FOSTERING AN ENTREPRENEURIAL SPIRIT

Business succession has always been important to the Réseau. We've been implementing the Youth Strategy since 1997, when it was established in collaboration with Canada Economic Development for Quebec Regions to try and convince young people to become entrepreneurs.

FLEXI-LOANS FOR WOMEN

Helping a new breed of entrepreneurs

Flexipreneurs have a part-time or even full-time job in addition to their business. They have many spinning plates up at once, as students, caregivers or seasonal workers. Not much is known about them because it is not a popular discussion topic in Quebec. And yet, it is a growing phenomenon, especially among women. Our Réseau and SADC Shawinigan have created a coaching and financing program to stimulate project development for this emerging clientele.

Dreaming big, on their own terms

Small businesses are the beating heart of rural economies, and many of them are part-time affairs, especially women-owned businesses. It is time to give these entrepreneurs the attention they deserve and offer flexible solutions that meet their unique needs.

The Flexi-Loan for Women initiative is a pilot project harnessing the expertise of 11 SADCs and CAEs across Quebec. These SADCs and CAEs develop support services and provide financing under favourable terms for hundreds of women from all walks of life.

The Flexi-Loan project helps sustain women-owned businesses in the long term, boosting their growth, innovation and productivity and in turn yielding greater economic and social benefits for Quebec. Quantitative and qualitative data will be collected throughout the course of the project, and the findings will be used to make recommendations for breaking down the barriers that flexipreneurs face in their careers.

The Honourable Marci Ien, Minister for Women and Gender Equality and Youth, commended the initiative and the \$296,000 investment in rolling out the project over three years. The 11 participating SADCs and CAEs will invest more than \$1.5 million altogether to provide loans for flexipreneurs in addition to other forms of support.

New Loans were recently issued to support flexipreneur-run businesses, and this is just the beginning.

FLEXIPRENEURSHIP: A GROWING PHENOMENON


Flexipreneurship is gaining traction in Quebec and has seen a sharp uptick among women in recent years. According to the latest data from Global Entrepreneurship Monitor, 72.3% of early-stage entrepreneurs run their businesses part time.

The word "flexipreneur" was coined by SADC Shawinigan to describe people who run businesses part time while juggling other work. The term was inspired by a SADC study that found that women entrepreneurs do not see themselves as entrepreneurs as it is typically defined in Quebec, and are hesitant to seek out support and financing as a result.



The Flexi-Loan project also helps the Réseau enhance its equity, diversity and inclusion (EDI) efforts. The EDI consultant sitting on the coordination committee ensures these three concepts are embedded in our decision making. We have also developed two training courses on EDI and inclusive writing for our members.

The Flexi-Loan program was launched in January 2024 at an event attended by the Honourable **François-Philippe Champagne**, Canada's Minister of Innovation, Science and Industry and Member of Parliament for Saint Maurice-Champlain, Quebec's Réseau des SADC et CAE and SADC Shawinigan.



THE CANADA DIGITAL ADOPTION PROGRAM COMES TO AN END

The Minister of International Trade, Export Promotion, Small Business and Economic Development asked the Réseau and the Fédération des chambres de commerce du Québec (FCCQ) to implement the Canada Digital Adoption Program (CDAP), and \$70 million over three years has been granted to accomplish this task. The CDAP delivered on its promises and helped hundreds of SMEs of all sizes and in all industries go digital via:

- → A team of e-commerce advisors who work with SMEs to help businesses in all of the province's administrative regions receive coaching services and carry out a 360 diagnostic
- \$2,400 micro-grants for e-commerce development to help businesses and entrepreneurs lower the cost of implementing e commerce projects

THIS YEAR:

429 e-commerce advisors were hired under CDAP to help SMEs go digital.

With this coaching, 3,685 businesses invested a total of \$6 million.

The CDAP may be wrapping up, but its commitment to helping SMEs go digital lives on through the regular activities of SADCs and CAEs, from support, financing and digital initiatives to e-commerce and new technologies.



Message from the President

RAYMOND CIMON

The organization's new governance structure was the highlight of the past year, with the arrival of new board administrators. I want to commend the exceptional professionalism of the team who helped them settle in seamlessly and with a great focus on transparency, in alignment with our organization's values.

This change in governance allowed us to make several updates to our general by-laws, something that had not been done in years. It was this spirit of modernization and transformation that carried us into 2023–2024.

Holding meetings more frequently and on a set schedule led to more robust discussions and quicker action, greatly benefiting Capital Réseau members. Having more administrators around the table also enriched our discussions on the organization's daily operations and the realities faced by users.

These conversations, and a few subsequent consultations with executive directors, allowed us, among other things, to establish a new model to sort out the issue of organizations that were simultaneously borrowing and investing.

The current economic climate, marked by rising interest rates, obviously required that administrators find innovative solutions to maintain the mobilizing force so prized by Capital Réseau. The operative word through all of this has clearly been "adaptation": to new members, new economic realities and operational changes such as the new deadlines for RRRF loan repayments. We have effectively adapted to all situations thrown our way.

This is also the year that I take a bow after many years on the Réseau's Board of Administrators, serving in multiple roles from Treasurer to Capital Réseau President. Having witnessed the growth journeys of so many of these organizations, I think I can safely declare a mission accomplished.

I hope that Capital Réseau continues to be a source of agility, mobilization and hope for its members.

Message from the Treasurer

JEAN-CLAUDE LAROCQUE

Capital Réseau had an incredibly busy 2023–2024! While our regular activities carried on as usual, the Board of Administrators was on the lookout for ways to boost SADC and CAE performance. This year, SADCs and CAEs issued 36 loans worth a total of \$9.3 million: 13 from the regular fund, totalling \$6.1 million, and 23 from the Youth Strategy fund, for a total of \$3.2 million. Capital Réseau's total assets are valued at \$142 million, with member equity accounting for 45% and control account assets accounting for 55%.

On the financial strategies front, the Board introduced special measures enabling Capital Réseau to offer SADCs and CAEs more competitive rates of return on their investments and better interest rates on loans. Members with outstanding Capital Réseau loan balances were encouraged to repay their loans using their investments. Capital Réseau continued its regular activities throughout the year, including the application of the popular interest rebate measure on Youth Strategy loans, which benefited 35 SADCs and 5 CAEs, proving to be an effective way to stimulate the uptake of Youth Strategy loans within communities.


Another notable achievement this year was the high repayment rate enjoyed by the business loan stream of the Regional Relief and Recovery Fund, established by the federal government in 2020 in response to COVID-19. On April 30, 2024, entrepreneurs collectively repaid a total of \$61.8 million in loans, delivered by SADCs and CAEs and administered by Capital Réseau. Recall that businesses could qualify for partial loan forgiveness (25% on the portion of the loan not exceeding \$40,000 and 50% on the portion between \$40,001 and \$60,000) by paying off the outstanding balance on or before March 28, 2024.




FISCAL YEAR ENDING MARCH 31, 2024
